After 16 years of operation at Caboolture, StC now has a co-educational enrolment of 955 Students, and will grow to around 1200 students in 2015, with the transition of Year 7 to Secondary.

2013 has seen the completion of the Mary MacKillop Performance Centre, which is located adjacent to our Trade Training Centre in Hospitality and Hairdressing. Our Sion Salon became the “green room” for stage performances and operates as a commercial and training salon. The Salon offers a variety of services and upskilling courses, whilst our Bobbio restaurant and Mary MacKillop Performance Centre can be booked for functions.

Recent Past Student Achievements

Evania Pelite – 2013 has been a very successful year for Evania, representing Australia in both Touch Football and Rugby Sevens. She developed her rugby ability through her Touch Football and as a member of the Queensland Schoolgirls Sevens Team that won the National Schools Rugby Sevens Tournament on the Gold Coast in 2012. In January of 2013 Evania was selected as a member of the Australian Youth Olympic Festival Sevens team that won Gold in Sydney in 2013. Following on from those performances she was brought into the Qantas Women's Sevens squad for the London Sevens and the IRB Women's Sevens World Series in Amsterdam.

2012 students, **Stephanie Brown, Siobhan Craik, Jayana Kerr and Sydney Bushnell**, were awarded the 2012 Australian Vocational Student Prize. Sydney was also awarded the 2012 Prime Minister's Award for excellence in school Vocational Education.

Excellent Year 12, 2012 outcomes – 93% of all Year 12 students received a tertiary rank/OP HS equivalent and 99% exited with a Certificate qualification.

Pelite climbs rapidly to top of her game

RUGBY UNION: At the age of 17 and only one year playing the sport, Deception Bay teen Evania Pelite will play for Australia.

One of the youngest in the Australian Women's Rugby Sevens squad, the utility player is not intimidated by the stars she will be alongside at the IRB Women's Sevens World Series.

The former St Columban's College student switched from touch football to rugby because of her teammate.

"Rebecca Tavo, the Australian captain, came to school when I was 16 and was talking about sevens," Pelite said. "I thought about starting rugby after that."

"We put in a school team and none of us had played before. We only had one training session on the morning before we played and we made it all the way to the grand final against all of these other schools in Queensland."

With her role model as a teammate, the youngster is working towards a spot in the Australian side for the 2016 Rio Olympics.

Round four of the IRB Women's Sevens World Series is in Amsterdam from May 17-18.

StC Senior Class of 1963 consisted of approximately 30 students. We were the leading edge of the post-World War II baby boom, and of the expansion of StC at Albion. In 1993 Ian Spence, assisted by Pat Cunningham, the late Geoff Wilson and others, initiated a 30 year reunion. These reunions have continued every two years since then – with attendance varying between 19 and 30. Our Principal, Ray Whiteman, was a regular attendee for about 15 years until his death. Ann Rebgetz has been a regular attendee since she became Principal.

Bobbio is the name of an Italian Monastery founded in 614 by Saint Columban. It's the name given to the restaurant which is part of the new and magnificent Mary MacKillop Performance Centre. Class of 1982 Reunion







Vale Mitchell Grehan (2002)

Mitch played prop, lock and fullback (an interesting range of positions) for StC TAS Rugby. Following these games, it was a mad rush to get back to the Sunshine Coast for League fixtures in the afternoon for the Wolves.

After he left school, Mitch worked in the construction industry – mainly in concreting. He had a year in SE Queensland before moving to Townsville to be with his family in 2004, continuing in the concreting game, working for a variety of firms and for himself. Mitch worked as a concreter/formsetter on roads, prisons, ports, mines, residential, commercial and industrial construction projects. Mine sites included Lady Annie, Mount Isa, Chillagoe and Ernest Henry as well as Sunmetal and Yabulu. He had a terrific work ethic and was a natural leader.

Mitch was a leading hand formsetter with S&N Civil Constructions at Ernest Henry Mine at the time of his passing. He was electrocuted moving a shipping container at his planned new home in Cloncurry on 30 January 2011. Mitch will be remembered by family, friends and the StC Community as a lovable larrikin.



Vale Jim Baker (1949)

Living in Woolloowin, Jim was a graduate of the 1949 Junior Class at Albion and went on to a career in radio communications with the Dept of Civil Aviation, followed by a successful career in computing. He was ultimately the Director, Computer Systems with Victorian TAB before being headhunted to the US where he spent some 20 years developing new systems and applications.

After retiring, Jim moved to Tasmania in 2008 where he lived with his daughter and extended family. Jim passed away on 29 June at the age of 79. He will be sadly missed by his family, friends and the StC Community.

The Banyo Playing Fields

As part of our continuing endeavour to keep the history of Columban's alive, the Association consulted Old Boy and long-time Brisbane resident, Joel Fleming about the history of the Elliott Road site. Joel's family has a long and dedicated history to the area and he provided the following information.

The Banyo playing fields land was part of an original 150 acre holding, extending the entire length of Elliott Road, owned by Mr Joseph Francis Fleming and his wife Sheila, who lived in their family home on the property with their nine children for many years. They bought the property from Nudgee College after selling their Scarborough property to Monsignor Frawley who built De La Salle College on that land.


The Brothers from StC visited the Fleming home one evening in the early 1960's to discuss the matter of sporting grounds for the College at Elliott Rd. StC bought the land and developed it into their playing fields, which were the scene of many memorable sporting events. StC subsequently sold the grounds to Padua College.

Joe Fleming was a grandson of Thomas and Catherine Fleming who came to Brisbane from Ireland on 'The Golden Dream' in 1863 and were early settlers of the Nudgee district. The Courier Mail of Friday 28 April 1899 published an Obituary for Mr Thomas Fleming, referring to him as a pilgrim father of Queensland. It read in part that the departed gentleman was held in special esteem by the late R.C. Bishop of Brisbane and by the good Sisters of Mercy of All Hallows and St Vincent's, who also held him in like-valued estimation.

It was reported that not only Mr Thomas Fleming's large family, but also all fellow-colonists, knew the sterling worth of the man. He was described as leaving 'a legacy of character, conduct, and industry, in which they and those coming after may share an honest and noble pride.'

A truly remarkable history of a place that has strong and undeniable links to StC!

Bro Con Moloney, with the assistance of Bro Marshall, must be acknowledged as being instrumental in the building of the Banyo Playing Fields.
